

Figure 2 - Attainment of a Bachelor Degree or above, by sex, 25-29 years, 2005 to 2015 (a)(b)




## A. Employment rates for women (25-54 years old) with no children and at least one child aged 0-14<sup>a</sup> years, 2014<sup>b</sup>
